A Lesson We've Learned


 Establish trust and respect amongst partners through consistency and a positive history of working toward common goals







- create a collective vision

- Example: EAEP /PSF project 2007




Participation: Community Involvement

Value of Watershed Planning

- Provides broad perspective and involves broad range of stakeholders
- · Encourages local ownership of the plan
- Powerful tool for fundraising and cooperative field action

Value of Field Actions

- · Increases understanding and cooperation
- Supports sustainable agriculture and fish populations: mutual benefit
- Demonstrates progress toward long term watershed sustainability

Value of Monitoring

- Encourages clearer explanation of issues
- Clarifies what works and what doesn't
- · broadens perspectives
- Can be used to multiply resource base



Value of Partnership and Participation

- · improves resource accessibility
- whole becomes greater than the sum of its parts: multiplying effect in a collective view
- Ex: fish, forestry and agriculture values and coexist...fish friendly agriculture is sustainable
- mutual learning opportunities are generated by sharing knowledge and experience
